SPECIAL SPEAKERS:

AXA Advisors- A representative (no name given) handed out full proposals to council members and supervisors as an option to current plan. Explained what his company does and highlighted employer match plans through the 457 Pension Plan.

CITIZENS:

Sylvia Buzby-510 Crawford Ave.- Asked about the chain link fence enclosure on the corner of Congress Ave. and Stafford Ave. Councilor Claudio explained that Waterfront Towing rents out the space and uses it for impounded vehicles. It was asked if that space is commercial and he said that since it has been used for parking it should receive a commercial designation.

Eric Lowther-535 Kensington Ave.- Trees on city property are falling onto his car and into his house. Mayor Reid said the city would look into solutions to get the trees down. Also reiterated that there are still cars speeding down Kensington Ave. and asked again for speed bumps to be installed. Traffic Committee agreed to meet to discuss. Thanked the Chief for the increased police presence.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS:

Article 1731 Signs- Attorney Paul Cranston explained that the city only has an annual permit fee of \$1 in the ordinance and that it needs to be increased to reflect the cost of the
